




# SURVEY OF PARENTS TENNESSEE STATEWIDE


### DETAILED RESULTS





#### **GRADE LEVEL**

The largest category of participants were parents of Kindergarten through 5th grade children, (60%). Parents of children from 10th through 12th grade made up the smallest percentage.



#### TYPE OF SCHOOL

A significant majority of respondents have children enrolled in public school, at 73%, with homeschool being the 2nd largest category, at 13%. Religious schools are most prevalent in Nashville (10%) and least prevalent in Memphis (5%).






#### PUBLIC SCHOOL DIRECTION

Three-quarters (76%) of parents with children in public schools feel that Tennessee schools are moving in the right direction, although only 18% feel fully confident in the direction of public schools in the State. Strongly negative and unsure parents make up a much smaller percentage, both at only 6%, while another 12% say schools are mostly on the wrong track.

#### SATISFACTION WITH PUBLIC SCHOOL

72% of those with children in public schools are satisfied with their child's experience with public schools in Tennessee., with 23% reporting being very satisfied. Somewhat and very dissatisfied both tie at 12%.



#### **EDUCATION OPTIONS FAVORABILITY**

A higher percentage of parents reported being very favorable education options at their child's school (47%), with 31% extending that satisfaction to their child's local school district. Both statewide public schools and public charter schools show 19% very favorable conditions. For every category besides "my child's school," most respondents felt somewhat favorable, between 35-45%.



#### **PUBLIC SCHOOL – NEED FOR CHANGE**

Two-thirds of parents report a need for change, while those who report the need for a lot of change and those who report needing a little consist of 26% and 27% respectively.

Black respondents are far more likely than Whites or other races to say that a lot of change is needed (41%). Likewise, 43% of respondents over age 50 say that a lot of change is needed.





## PUBLIC SCHOOL – NEED FOR CHANGE 1/2

Parents overall strongly agree with the specific needs presented in the survey (39-48%), with similar percentages reflected in the agree somewhat category (35-39%). Agreement is highest with the statement that funding should be used to ensure that schools are modern and equipped with up-to-date technology.



### PUBLIC SCHOOL – NEED FOR CHANGE 2/2


The lowest level of agreement is found for statements relating to teacher salaries being tied to performance, and the need for strict oversight of chronically underperforming schools.












#### **NUMBER OF CHILDREN**
